We believe that placemaking projects – like murals – create a sense of belonging and strong ties to a place that encourage economic activity for the many small businesses along the Lake Street corridor.

In 2021, the Lake Street Council created the Placemaking and Vibrancy Grant program. To date, we have provided 31 Placemaking and Vibrancy Grants throughout the corridor, which total more than \$350,000.




